Dear Mr. Rajesh Bhushan,

At the outset, we wish you a Happy New Year.

In order that the happiness be shared by all Indians through the year 2023, it is necessary that fear-based public health measures be replaced with evidence-based measures. We write this in response to your letter dated 20 Dec 2022 (D.O.No.Z.28015/182/2021-DMCell) warning of rising Covid-19 "cases" in parts of the world, which has triggered a series of fear-based measures.

- At the outset, hundreds of years of known science, as well as research on Covid-19 in the last three years has shown that immunity after natural infection & recovery, is <u>strong</u>, <u>long-lasting</u> and far <u>superior</u> to vaccine-induced immunity. And <u>sero-surveys</u> have shown that most Indians were naturally exposed to the virus, even as of July 2021.
- 2. Such immunity is strong regardless of variants. Furthermore, the natural evolution path of a virus is toward less dangerous variants, and this has been the case with SARS-Cov-2 as well. India did *not* have a third wave for the same reason. The slums of Mumbai did *not* have even a second wave for the same reason.
- Testing and tracing have <u>not worked</u> to contain SARS-Cov-2 spread. As of July 2021, the
  detected "cases" were a mere 3.3% of the estimated Indians <u>exposed</u>. That is, only 1-in30 infections were actually detected: mass testing wasted people's money aside from
  spreading anxiety.
- 4. Calling for more of the experimental Covid-19 vaccines, when countries like Singapore, Taiwan, Japan, etc have <u>faced</u> Covid-19 waves even after widespread vaccine coverage, is the exact opposite of being evidence-based. Instead, resources and effort must go into <u>probing</u> the increased sudden and unexplained deaths among young and healthy people; such increase is time-correlated with the vaccine rollout and is highly concerning.

Covid-19 never was the *only* health issue. For instance, nearly 2000 children die in India of preventable malnutrition related causes, *everyday*. Exaggerating fear of Covid-19, especially at this stage when almost all Indians have natural immunity, is not only intellectually dishonest, it is also counter-productive. We therefore call for an immediate and explicit stop to spreading baseless and exaggerated fear of Covid-19 among Indians. We should instead have evidence-based public health measures in the future.
